SESSION 1

Letter to Families

-

Welcome to the Fall 2023 quarter of Shine! For the next 13 weeks, we will explore Old Testament stories from Genesis and Exodus, stories that were told orally for generations before they were ever written down. They are the stories that reflect the journey of our faith from its beginnings. These family activity suggestions are to help you continue sharing the story at home.

Pray Together!

Pray using Psalm 121. Read Psalm 121 together as a family or find a musical arrangement of Psalm 121 to listen to together. Set aside a few times each week to pray together.

Play together!

Fall is a wonderful season to spend time outside together. Go on a bingo hike. Make a bingo card with objects for children to look for as you go through your neighborhood, based on items you can find near your home, such as a rock, cloud, blade of grass, or pretty leaf. See who can find bingo first!

Eat Together!

Food is mentioned several times in the stories this quarter: the yogurt and bread Abraham and Sarah offered their visitors, the lentil stew Jacob gave Esau, and the flatbread made by the Israelites as they fled Egypt.

Try making this simple flatbread that only takes minutes to prepare and cook.

Ingredients:

- 2 cups / 300 g flour
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp / 2 ml salt
- 4 T / 60 ml butter
- 34 cup / 185 ml milk
- 1 T / 15 ml oil

Instructions:

- 1. Combine flour and salt in a large mixing bowl. Heat milk and butter until the butter is melted. Pour into flour mixture and stir until blended.
- 2. Sprinkle work surface with flour and knead dough for about 2 minutes. If dough is sticky, add more flour. Wrap in plastic wrap and let rest at room temperature for 30 minutes.
- 3. Cut dough into 4 pieces. Roll pieces into balls and roll flat.

Heat oil in a nonstick pan over medium heat. Cook flatbread on both sides for about 1 minute on each side.

"Four Corners" Game Instructions

Follow these instructions to play the "Four Corners" Game in Explore (Move).

- 1. On four sheets of paper write the names of four places Abram and his family visited: Haran, Shechem, Bethel, and the Southern Desert. Place one sign in each corner of your meeting space.
- 2. Choose one person to be the counter. Blindfold this person and place him or her in the center of the room.
- 3. While the counter counts aloud to 10, the rest of the children will move around to the different corners of the room.
- 4. When the counter gets to 10, children must choose a corner and stop moving. Without looking, the counter will call out the name of one place: Haran, Shechem, Bethel, or the Southern Desert. Any children who are in the corner named by the counter must sit down for the rest of the round.
- 5. Continue playing by repeating steps 2–4 until only one person remains. This person then becomes the new counter.

SESSION 2 Aryan

Aryan is a yogurt drink served in many places in the Middle East. Imagine drinking a cool glass of Aryan after a long journey through the hot desert.

You will need:

- 2 cups / 500 ml plain yogurt
- 2 cups / 500 ml cold water
- 1 tsp / 5 ml sea salt
- chopped mint or cucumber (optional)
- blender (or a large bowl and a whisk)
 - Mix together the yogurt, water, and salt in a blender or in a bowl with a whisk.
 - 2. Pour into glasses. Top with mint or cucumber (optional).
 - 3. Enjoy!

Recipe makes 4 servings.

SESSION 3 A Blessing Blows

Use suggestions as directed in Connect to Each Other.

"Making a Class Covenant" Instructions

Follow these instructions to create a class covenant.

Before the session: At the top of a piece of posterboard, write "We will create space to worship God." Halfway down the poster, write "We will welcome and respect each other."

- 1. Ask children to imagine a space where they can worship God with their hearts, minds, spirits, and bodies. What might that sound like, feel like, and look like? Have children write their suggestions on sticky notes and place them on the top section of the poster.
- 2. Ask children to think about what is needed to create a space where everyone feels welcome and respected. Have children write their suggestions on sticky notes and place the notes on the bottom section of the poster.
- 3. Read the sticky notes out loud and notice which ideas are repeated. Talk about which agreements seem the most important for your group. Write two or three in each section of the poster and display in the classroom.

For smaller groups: ask each person to write down two or three ideas on sticky notes and offer your own suggestions as well.

SESSION 3

Kintsugi Bowl

Background Information

How can something that is broken be beautiful? For more than 500 years, Japanese artists have been creating beauty out of broken pottery. Using a process called Kintsugi, artists use glue and gold dust to put broken pottery pieces back together. Instead of trying to hide the damage when they fix pots, the artists use gold to repair the places where the pot was broken. The repaired places come to be viewed as the most beautiful parts.

Jacob broke his brother's trust by stealing Esau's blessing. Jacob was afraid he would never be able to fix the hurt and pain he had caused. He thought Esau would always be angry with him, and their relationship would be broken forever. But to his surprise, his brother hugged him. Esau and Jacob made peace and their relationship was restored. Just like the gold Kintsugi pottery line, the brothers' healed relationship is the most beautiful part of their story.

Paper Kintsugi Bowl Directions

Follow the directions to make a Kintsugi bowl with paper during Explore (Create).


Make copies of the bowl template (on the next page) onto white paper and cut out one for each child. Give a cut-out bowl and a piece of colored construction paper to each child. Have each child decorate his or her bowl, then tear the bowl into four pieces.

Lay the torn pieces on the construction paper to re-form the bowl, such as puzzle pieces. Separate the pieces slightly, leaving spaces between them while keeping the shape of a bowl. Glue the pieces to the construction paper. Use colored glitter markers or tubes of glitter glue to draw on the line between the pieces and let dry.




SESSION 3 Kintsugi Bowl Template

SESSION 5

Snack Recipe

Ingredients

- Family size bag of mini pretzels
- · Large bag of candy-coated chocolates
- Large bag of mini marshmallows
- · Two boxes of graham cracker bears
- · Large bag of dried cranberries or raisins
- · Two boxes of goldfish crackers
- · Large bag of sunflower or pumpkin seeds

Instructions


Gather ingredients and choose an option below for assembling the snack mix. Have children wash hands before handling food and remind them not to sample or lick their fingers as they fill their bags.

Option 1: Place ingredients in seven separate bowls with spoons or small measuring cups at each bowl. Talk about how important the number 7 was in the story. Have children fill two zippered resealable bags with ingredients from each of the bowls, counting each ingredient up to seven as they add it to their bags: one for them to eat and one for them to share.

Option 2: Have children measure 1 cup / 128 g of each ingredient into a large bowl and mix ingredients together with a large spoon. Count each ingredient as it goes into the bowl (seven) and talk about how the number seven was important in today's story. Have children measure 1 cup / 128 g of the mix into two zippered resealable bags: one to eat and one to share.


"Paper Basket" Template

- Name two of the people who helped keep Moses safe when he was a baby. (Chapter 7) his mother, his sister, Pharaoh's daughter
- Miriam sang a song praising God. Sing a song you know about God's love. (Chapter 10) various answers
